I grew up in Maylands and I attended the Maylands Primary School. I still have a very close friend that I met at Primary School. I have a son and a daughter, five grandchildren and three great-grandchildren.

My father was a butcher and when I was 12 he took a job as the manager of a butcher shop in Penguin Road, Safety Bay. Our house was attached to the



back of the shop. At that time, there was a picture theatre in Safety Bay. Rae Road came to a dead end half way to Read Street. Rockingham City Shopping Centre had not even been thought of. There were no round-a-bouts, and of course, no traffic lights.

After about two years, we moved back to Maylands and I went to Girdlestone High School. My first job was as a shorthand typist in the Companies Office in the Supreme Court Building, Perth.

I married a Safety Bay man, and moved back to Safety Bay. He was a butcher, but in 1962 he decided to become a crayfisherman. We moved to Snag Island, a very isolated spot, south of Dongara, which is now called Leeman. We had no modern conveniences at all. No shops, no electricity, we carried water from a nearby well. We had a kerosene fridge and Tilly lamps. Crayfishing was a seasonal job, so we lived at Snag Island for about six months of the year, then back to Safety Bay for the remainder of the year. Our children handled correspondence school lessons and then a regular school quite well. There is a plaque in Leeman, on our block, proclaiming this to be where one of the first houses was built.

Due to ill health, my husband left the crayfishing industry and we moved back to Safety Bay permanently. He had a professional licence to fish, have crab pots and net fish. I was involved in of all these things as I always loved the outdoors and fishing.

It was when my husband passed away in 1978 that I started bridge lessons with Peg Brady. I partnered my mother for some time. I was a volunteer on Penguin Island for twenty five years. I enjoyed the interaction with the visitors and helping to care for the penguins.

I met Ron at the Bridge Club, and have had many happy years, travelling - and of course playing Bridge.

CALLING THE DIRECTOR

A director **MUST** be called whenever something untoward happens whilst playing bridge! That is, when there is an infringement of bridge rules, procedures and behaviour. Any player, **EXCEPT** the dummy, is permitted to call the director.

It is **NOT** ok, even if you think you know what the director will say, to make any decision between yourselves at the table.

The reason for calling a director is not to punish or to belittle, but to rule on an infringement in a fair and equitable way for all parties concerned. In other words to ensure a level playing field. Beginners should not feel dreadful if the opposition calls a director. It is part and parcel of playing bridge, and even the most experienced of bridge players can be in breach of bridge rules and procedures at times.

All directors endeavour to apply their knowledge in an impartial way to determine a ruling on a multitude of bridge infractions - simple or complex.

As a bridge player, it would be beneficial to learn the basic bridge laws applicable to such things as dummy's rights, penalty cards, bidding, as well as your responsibilities as a participant at the bridge table.

Finally, if you do call a director, remember your manners and say 'Director, **Please'.** They work hard to become a director, and if we did not have them, we would not be able to play this wonderful game.

The Psychiatrist and the Proctologist


Best friends graduating from medical school at the same time decided that in spite of two different specialties, they would open a practice together to share office space and personnel.
