The club continued to run smoothly in my absence thanks to your committee headed by Cheryl. Thank you so much.


I have to remind you what a wonderful committee we have and we welcomed Helen Hansell onto it to assist the treasurer. She has been a great help and we thank you, Helen.

RAEWYN'S YUMMY SAVOURY CHEESE MUFFINS

INGREDIENTS

tablespoon chopped celery
 tablespoon chopped capsicum
 4 cup grated cheese
 cups plain flour
 Pinch of cayenne pepper
 teaspoons of baking powder
 teaspoon salt
 egg, beaten
 g butter melted
 ½ cups of milk

METHOD

- Put celery, capsicum and cheese into a bowl. Sift flour, cayenne, baking powder and salt into the bowl. Stir to combine.

- Spoon mixture into a greased muffin tray and bake at 200 for 15 minutes.



My Story Wendy Pollock.

I was born in Christchurch NZ, a post war baby, and spent a difficult childhood there.

My parents split when I was only five years old so my only sibling, my older brother, was the man of our house. His passion, flying aeroplanes, took his life when I was only 13. This of course was devastating for me and my mother.



I was a rebellious child and only gained average marks at

secondary school. After secondary school I went Nursing. I had a ball. I loved the work and study, I partied hard and I met my best mate, later to become my husband, Trevor. However, after 18 months of training I resigned to nurse my mother through to the end of her life when she died of cancer.

In 1966 Trevor and I married and later had three lovely children whom we are immensely proud of and they have given us five wonderful grandchildren.

We both began to play social and later club bridge which I became addicted to.

During this time, I could not settle and as an example of this, we have lived in 28 houses, owned 34 cars and travelled to over 60 countries. I must have been exceedingly difficult to live with.

We moved from New Zealand to Australia in 1982 but still could not settle. So, from there we lived in Sydney, Brisbane and back to Sydney.

I played bridge in Sydney.

We moved to Rockingham WA in 2007 where the first thing I did was join the Rockingham Bridge club. I could not live without it even though my play is not so good!

We are now proud to have become Australian citizens and after travelling to Africa, I began to change my thinking. I have heard it said that Africa gets in your blood. Well it certainly got into my blood. Ten years ago, I began a charity to care for and educate and love many Ugandan orphan children. I have worked extremely hard for these children - many now young adults.

I am so proud of my natural family and my Ugandan family. They are my life.

I could not have done what I have without the undying support of Trevor. although I am sure I drive him mad at times.

In the last five years I have been denied my adventure and travel somewhat as I have battled cancer, endured chemo and two rounds of radiation - but I will not give in.

Covid has restrained much of what we had intended for this last year and it has severely restricted my much needed fundraising for the charity. However, I did manage to complete a 21 k walk to raise money for Uganda.

I have been told at the bridge club that I hog the microphone and for that I apologize. Even though I am a bit out-spoken I am super loyal to my family, friends, my charity and the orphans and of course to the Rockingham Bridge Club.

'I played a deal on line as South and ended up with 3NT + 3 (490 points). The deal analysis page indicates that this deal can be played as 7NT'

' I re-tried several times, went straight to 7NT, but all attempts ended up as 7NT -1. West's AK is a serious problem that I failed to avoid.'

SOLUTION:

Win the club lead in hand, cash the spade ace, take the diamond finesse, and play on diamonds, pitching spades.

Eventually, west has to unguard a round suit to keep the spade control, and now you have a double squeeze, with west controlling spades and one round suit, and east controlling both round suits.

Cash dummy's winner in the round suit controlled only by east, then return to hand with the heart king.

Now we've got to a standard double squeeze position; cash the last diamond, forcing east to unblock one suit, pitching the suit that east keeps.

West will be forced to let go the last guard to one of your suits, and your thirteenth trick has materialized.




